Cultural competence is often seen as

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encompassing only racial and ethnic differences, omitting other marginalized population groups who are ethnically and racially similar to a provider but who are at risk for stigmatization or discrimination, are different in other identities, or have differences in healthcare needs that result in health disparities.

### **What is Cultural Competence & How is it Measured ...**

Cultural competence is the knowledge,  
behaviours, attitudes, policies and  
systems that enable service providers

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and workers to work effectively in cross-cultural situations and respond to the needs of a culturally diverse population. Cultural competence is required at both the organisational and individual levels.

### **Standards and Indicators for Cultural Competence**

We could define cultural competence,
